Career Prep is a course that focuses on exploring career options available to Alberta students. This course is offered by Ms. Strychalski: "This course is helping students get to know themselves and how that can translate that knowledge into a career. They can earn anywhere from 1 to 5 credits depending on the number of modules they complete." Student have enjoyed learning that there are a number of careers out there that they never knew existed.

Mr. MacEachern teaches Digital Music. He is a very accomplished musician with a great deal of expertise with traditional instruments as well as synthesizers and computer-generated "beats".

"The class allows students to approach CTS credits like Digital Presentation and Visual Composition with a focus on their musical or AV-related interests," stated Mr. MacEachern. "As we get better at understanding and using the software, we intend to provide the opportunity to earn other credits such as General Music. Students have also been making and sampling beats in order to rap over them, and we were happy to hear from some of these artists at our recent talent show."

Not only are students developing advanced computer skills, but they are also able to build on their interest in music. "Students have been getting the hang of the basics of the very complex software," stated Mr. MacEachern, "but there's always more to learn and do, and we can't spend all day in the music lab. That's why we're planning

Mr. Tisdale, principal, is offering both Tourism and Mechanics: "Mechanics 3010 is about buying and selling vehicles. It's great to know some basic things to look for when buying a vehicle and some strategies to employ when trying to sell one."

Textiles is currently being offered as a workshop by Ms. Amundson, who also teaches the ever-popular Foods. "For the first time, we are diving into the world of textiles. On two of the workshop Fridays, students can choose to make a tie-blanket, a square quilt or a pair of pajama bottoms."

The students are loving it. "We are enjoying getting to know each other while we work side by side completing our different projects,"

stated Ms. Amundson. "Students show a great sense of pride in their finished projects and it has been fun working with them in this unique

Photography offers the students the opportunity to get more than a dozen credits, including up to six 30-level credits, which is often critical to getting a high school diploma. We have many students with tremendous artistic skill. Photography is definitely a great outlet for students looking for a way to express themselves artistically while learning a lot of extremely valuable computing skills.

"We are continuing our very successful Photography program," stated Mr. Wilkinson. "We started the year outdoors doing close-up

and landscape photography. We are now working indoors learning to edit in Photoshop. Students are also learning the basics of studio photography, starting with learning how to do lighting of close-up subjects. After Christmas we will move on to portrait photography, ultimately learning to use multiple synced strobes for individual and group portraits."

It's a popular course that produces the dozens of framed images found throughout our school.

"Photography is my favourite subject," stated Destiney Daychild-Rabbit, student. "It's really fun to edit and take pictures. I'm also getting lots of credits."

"This school year has been good," stated Aza Buffalo. "I have learned something new every day. I really like Photography because I love taking pictures and editing them. It's the easiest way to get credits while having a lot of fun."


